Regarding Wilton's economic and racial diversity, the following may be of interest: According to the US Census, on July 1, 2019 84.5% of Wilton's population was white. According to the 2000 Census, 95.6% of Wilton's population was white. The 19-year increase in racial diversity was achieved through several means including, construction of multi-family housing, workforce expansion at ASML, a new Hindu Temple and perhaps the reduction in home values since the 2007 recession.

During the same time period, according to the US Census, median household income decreased from \$197,428 in 2000 to \$187,903 in 2019. This was primarily driven by the 2007 recession and the resulting permanent loss of high paying financial sector jobs. According to the 2017 IRS statistical data for Wilton tax filers, the average adjusted gross income (AGI) for those tax returns with an AGI greater than \$200,000 is down 23% versus 2007 tax filers.

Regarding private and public golf courses:

Rolling Hills is the one private country club in Wilton. It is located on privately owned land. Even if Wilton voters were interested in doing so, the Town of Wilton cannot force the taking of that land.

Rolling Hills is located on just over 150 acres of land. Wilton has very little remaining land for development, none of which that I know of is large enough for a golf course. One of the last remaining large parcels in Wilton recently sold at auction. It had approximately 150 acres, but over 30 acres were non developable wetlands. If there were an available parcel up for sale, you and other interested taxpayers could certainly bring forth a proposal to the Parks and Recreation Commission and the Board of Selectmen. As an FYI, Ridgefield's FY2021 operating expense and maintenance capital budget for the golf course is \$1.26 million. That number does not include debt amortization for land acquisition and construction.
